### **EPISTLE : ROMANS 13:11-14:4**

**rethren,** do this, knowing the time, that now it is high time to awake out of sleep; for now our salvation is nearer than when we first believed. The night is far spent, the day is at hand. Therefore let us cast off the works of darkness, and let us put on the armor of light. Let us walk properly, as in the day, not in revelry and drunkenness, not in lewdness and lust, not in strife and envy. But put on the Lord Jesus Christ, and make no provision for the flesh, to fulfill its lusts. Receive one who is weak in the faith, but not to disputes over doubtful things. For one believes he may eat all things, but he who is weak eats only vegetables. To declare Thy mercy in the morning, and Thy truth by night.


## GOSPEL: MATTHEW 6:14-21

**HE LORD SAID,** "For if you forgive men their trespasses, your heavenly Father will also forgive you. But if you do not forgive men their trespasses, neither will your Father forgive your trespasses. Moreover, when you fast, do not be like the hypocrites, with a sad countenance. For they disfigure their faces that they may appear to men to be fasting. Assuredly, I say to you, they have their reward. But you, when you fast, anoint your head and wash your face, so that you do not appear to men to be fasting, but to your Father who is in the secret place; and your Father who sees in secret will reward you openly. Do not lay up for yourselves treasures on earth, where moth and rust destroy and where thieves break in and steal; but lay up for yourselves treasures in heaven, where neither moth nor rust destroys and where thieves do not break in and steal. For where your treasure is, there your heart will be also."+

# GREAT LENT

The period of preparation leading up to Holy Week and Pascha. Observance of Great Lent is characterized by abstention from many foods, intensified private and public prayer, personal improvement, and almsgiving.

- 1. Sunday of the Triumph of Orthodoxy the service is to commemorate the triumph of Faith, and restoration of icons for use in services and private devotional life of Christians. Services often include the clergy or the faithful triumphantly processing around the church, holding icons of their patron or parish saints.
- 2. **Sunday of St. Gregory Palamas** by prayer and fasting human beings can become participants of the uncreated light of God's divine glory even in this life The spiritual theme adds to the First Sunday of Great Lent's theme, faith. In addition to faith, one needs *effort*.
- 3. **Sunday of the Veneration of the Holy Cross** the spiritual theme starts to change from personal faith, and personal effort, to Christ. The Church fathers equate the life-giving cross with the tree of life and plant it in the middle of the Lenten pilgrimage. The focus is on victory, not suffering.
- 4. **Sunday of St. John Climacus** This Sunday's theme is St John's witness to the real spiritual struggle needed for entrance into God's Kingdom.
- 5. **Sunday of St. Mary of Egypt** This Sunday's theme has three parts. First, no amount of past sin and wickedness can keep a truly repentant person from God. 2nd, Christ himself has come to call sinners to repentance and to save them from their sins (Luke 5:32). 3rd, in St. Mary we see that it is never too late in life, or in Lent, to repent. Christ will gladly receive all who come to him with sincere repentance, even at the eleventh hour.

The original purpose of the pre-Pascha fast (now known as Great Lent) was the fasting of catechumens who were being prepared for baptism and entry into the Church. However, it quickly became a time for those who were already Christian to prepare for the feast of the Resurrection of Christ. It is the living symbol of man's entire life which is to be fulfilled in his own resurrection from the dead with Christ. It is a time of renewed devotion: of prayer, fasting, and almsgiving. It is a time of repentance, most of all, of return to the great commandments of loving God and neighbors.
